On the Epistle to the Galatians

"With Paul we boast that we teach the pure Gospel of Christ. Not only should the pope, the sectarians, the fathers, and the church submit to this Gospel; they should receive it with open arms, accept it gratefully, embrace it, and propagate it to others. But if anyone teaches otherwise, whether the pope or St. Augustine or an Apostle or an angel from heaven, let him and his gospel be accursed. Still we do not make any progress but are forced to hear that our boasting is not only vain, brazen, and arrogant but blasphemous and demonic. And yet, if we lower ourselves and yield to the ravings of our opponents, both the papists and the sectarians will become proud. The sectarians will brag that they are bringing some strange new doctrine never before heard of by the world, and the papists will reestablish their old abominations. Therefore let everyone take care to be most certain of his calling and doctrine, so that he may boldly and surely say with Paul (Gal. 1:8): 'Even if we, or an angel from heaven, etc.'

"So much, then, on the central proposition of this passage, which is: 'I have not received my Gospel from a man, but through a revelation of Jesus Christ.' Now he will prove this proposition at length by citing many historical events.

"'For you have heard of my former life in Judaism, how I persecuted the church of God violently and tried to destroy it; and I advanced in Judaism beyond many of my own age among my people' (Gal. 1:13-14). Nothing is needed here but word study. Paul is citing his own example: 'I once defended Pharisaism and Judaism more vigorously and steadfastly than you and your false teachers did. Therefore if the righteousness of the Law were worth anything, I would have remained a Pharisee. For I, too, was a Pharisee, and I pursued the traditions of the fathers with greater zeal than the false apostles do today. And yet I regarded them and all Judaism as of little worth.'

"Thus I [Luther], too, suffered greater trouble in vigils and fasts when I was a monk than all those who persecute me today. I was superstitious to the point of delirium and insanity, and to the jeopardy of my body and its health. Whatever I did, I did with great zeal and for the sake of God. I adored the pope sincerely, not out of a desire for prebends or riches. And yet in comparison with the righteousness of Christ I threw away these [excrements]. But our blind and hardhearted opponents do not believe that I as well as others have had experience with such Pharisaism.

"'So extremely zealous was I for the traditions of my fathers' (Gal. 1:14). Here Paul does not call the traditions of the fathers 'pharisaical' or 'human' traditions, as Jerome supposes. For in this passage he is not discussing the traditions of the Pharisees; he is discussing a much sublimer issue. Therefore he calls even the holy Law of Moses 'the traditions of my fathers,' in the sense that they were handed down and received as a legacy from the fathers. 'For these,' he says, 'I was very zealous when I was a part of Judaism.' He speaks the same way to the Philippians (3:5-6): 'As to the Law I was a Pharisee, as to zeal a persecutor of the church, as to righteousness under the Law blameless.'

"It is as though he were saying: 'Here I may brag openly and put myself against the entire Jewish people, even the best and holiest of all those who belong to the circumcision. Let them show me, if they can, a more zealous and earnest defender of the Law of Moses than I was! I was an outstanding zealot for the traditions of the fathers, a devotee of the righteousness of the Law. This in itself, you Galatians, should have persuaded you not to believe these deceivers, who lay great stress on the righteousness of the Law as an issue of great importance. For if there were any grounds for boasting in the righteousness of the Law, I would have more grounds for boasting than anyone else."
