

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The Second Week of Epiphany Tide

This Week in the Church Year

The Epiphany Season continues our confession and celebration of the Word-made-Flesh, which began with the Feast of the Nativity of Our Lord (the Christ-Mass) in December. In the proclamation of St. John the Baptist, "Behold, the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world," we are given to see that the Glory of God in Christ will be fully manifested by His sacrificial death upon the Cross for the atonement and reconciliation of the world. There, for the sake of His own divine Love, He laid down His life for the salvation of sinners! And as the true Passover Lamb who was sacrificed for us, He feeds His people (baptized into Him) with His body and His blood unto the life everlasting.

Emphasis: The Glory of God in Christ Is Revealed by His Cross

The Order of Daily Catechesis in Word and Prayer

Pray and confess out loud as much from the order of daily catechesis as you and your family are able. Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

Almighty and everlasting God, You govern all things in heaven and on earth. Mercifully hear the prayers of Your people and grant us Your peace through all our days; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now & forever. (*Amen*)

Daily Themes for Intercessory Prayer:

Sunday:	For the joy of the Resurrection; for the faithful preaching and hearing of God's Word; for the fruit of faith nourished by the Word and Sacraments.
Monday:	For faith to live in the promises of Holy Baptism; for vocations and daily work; for the unemployed; for the salvation and well-being of our neigh- bors; for Resurrection Lutheran Academy and other schools, our home

The Feast of the Confession of St. Peter

The Confession of St. Peter was made in response to the most important question Jesus asked: "Who do people say that the Son of Man is?" (St. Matthew 16:13–20). The Disciples responded: "John the Baptist, Elijah, Jeremiah, or one of the other Prophets." But then Jesus asked the Disciples, pointedly, whom they held Him to be. Peter, speaking for the Twelve, replied: "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." This Confession did not arise in the imagination of Peter's heart but was revealed to him by the Father. The reason this Confession is important then follows: "You are Peter [Greek Petros], and on this rock [Greek petra] I will build My Church." As the people of God in the Old Testament began with the person of Abraham—the rock from which God's people were hewn (Isaiah 51:1–2)—so the people of God in the New Testament would begin with this man—the Apostle, Simon Peter, who as a minister of the Gospel served as the rock on

which Christ would build His Church. Yet, St. Peter was not alone in this ministry; the "Keys" that were given to him here were given to all the Disciples in St. Matthew 18:18 and St. John 20:21–23. As St. Paul tells us, St. Peter and the other Apostles (and the Prophets) together are formed as the foundation of the Church, of which Christ Jesus Himself is the Cornerstone (Ephesians 2:20). The Confession of Peter, therefore, is the witness of the entire apostolic band, which is foundational in the building of Christ's Church. So do we give thanks to God for St. Peter and the other Apostles who have instructed Christ's holy Church in His divine and saving truth.

Commemoration of the Matriarch Sarah

Friday, 20 January

Sarah was the wife (and half-sister) of the Patriarch Abraham (Gen. 11:29; 20:12). In obedience to divine command (Gen. 12:1), she made the long and arduous journey west, along with her husband and his relatives, from Ur of the Chaldees to Haran and then finally to the land of Canaan. She remained childless until old age. Then, in keeping with God's long-standing promise, she gave birth to a son, Isaac, the heir of the covenant (Gen. 21: 1-3). Sarah is remembered and honored as the wife of Abraham and the mother of Isaac. She is also favorably noted for her hospitality to strangers (Gen. 18:1-8). Following her death at the age of 127, she was laid to rest in the Cave of Machpelah (Gen. 49:13), where her husband was later buried.

Let each his lesson learn with care, and all the household well shall fare.

Isaiah 9:1–4: The people who have lived and walked in the darkness of sin, death, and unbelief, are given to see the rising of a great Light in Christ Jesus.

1 Corinthians 1:10–18: The Body of Christ is not to be divided by allegiances to men, but united in the Cross of Christ through Holy Baptism in His Name. Only by the "foolish" preaching of the Word of this Cross is anyone saved.

St. Matthew 4:12–25: The Kingdom of Heaven is at hand in the Person of Jesus Christ, on His Way of the Cross for the Salvation of the world. He calls all men to repent, and to follow Him in the faith and life of discipleship. He likewise calls some of His disciples—as in the cases of Andrew & Simon Peter, and James & John, the sons of Zebedee—to leave their former vocations in life and to become fishers of men, bearing the particular cross of the Holy Ministry.
