

The Second Week of Eastertide

This Week in the Church Year

For many centuries, across the entire Church, both East and West, the Holy Gospel for the Second Sunday of Easter has been the appearance of the resurrected Christ to His Apostles—on the evening of the first Easter Sunday, when Thomas was not present, and then again on the Eighth Day of Easter, when He brought Thomas from his doubts and unbelief to faith and confidence in Him. We note especially the means of grace in this Gospel: the holy wounds of Christ, which are opened to us in His Body and Blood in the Holy Communion, and His Word of Holy Absolution in the Office of the Keys.

Emphasis: Christ Jesus Bestows His Spirit through Absolution

The Order of Daily Catechesis in Word and Prayer

Pray and confess out loud as much from the order of daily catechesis as you and your family are able. Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

[The Opening Versicles and Psalmody]:

O Lord, open my lips. And my mouth will declare Your praise.

Make haste, O God, to deliver me. Make haste to help me, O Lord.

Commemoration of Johann Walter, Lutheran Kantor

Johann Walter (1496-1570) began service at the age of 21 as a composer and bass singer in the court chapel of Frederick the Wise. In 1524, he published a collection of hymns arranged according to the church year. It was well received and served as the model for numerous subsequent hymnals. In addition to serving for 30 years as kantor (church musician) in the cities of Torgau and Dresden, he also assisted Martin Luther in the preparation of the Deutsche Messe (1526). Walter is remembered as the first Lutheran kantor and composer of church music.

The Feast of St. Mark, the Evangelist

St. Mark was the author of the second Gospel, which he composed, according to some early Church Fathers, when the Christians in Rome asked him to write down the preaching of the Apostle Peter. Mark, also known as John Mark, was originally from Jerusalem, where the house of his mother Mary was the center of the early Jerusalem Church (Acts 12:12). He was brought from Jerusalem by Paul and Barnabas to Antioch (12:25) before setting out with them on the first

missionary journey. When Paul and Barnabas were preparing to go on the second missionary journey, Barnabas wanted to take Mark with them again, but Paul objected because Mark had left them during the first journey. Barnabas took Mark and went to Cyprus, while Paul took Silas as his new companion (15:37–40). Later on Paul reconciled with Mark and was working with him again (Colossians 4:10; Philemon 24; 2 Timothy 4:11). Finally, Mark was found laboring with Peter in Rome (1 Peter 5:13). Tradition says that Mark was instrumental in founding the Church in Alexandria and became its first bishop, and also that he suffered a martyr's death.

Let each his lesson learn with care, and all the household well shall fare.

1 Peter 1:17–25: You have been redeemed from the futility of your sinful life, not with perishable things like gold and silver, but with the precious blood of the spotless Lamb of God, Jesus Christ. Therefore, even though your own mortal flesh—together with all the temporal world—withers and fades like the grass, the Word of the Lord that is preached to you endures forever and preserves you.

St. Luke 24:13–35: The precious Holy Gospel for which our congregation is named ("Emmaus") sets forth the way of catechesis: on the road with Jesus. He, by the preaching of His Word and with His Holy Spirit, opens the eyes of your heart and mind to see Him by faith throughout the Holy Scriptures and in the life of His Church on earth. In particular, the resurrected Lord Jesus Christ is with us and reveals Himself to us in the "Breaking of the Bread," in the Holy Communion. His Body is not in the empty tomb, but at His Altar in His Church.
