

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The Sixth Week of Eastertide

This Week in the Church Year

The Feast of the Ascension of Our Lord on Thursday of this week (25 May), as well as the continued reading of the Acts of the Apostles throughout Eastertide, indicates the way and means by which the risen and ascended Lord Jesus Christ is with us and cares for His Church on earth. As He called and sent the Holy Apostles, so does He call men to follow in their train, who are "sent" in His Name and stead, with His divine authority. Even to the close of the age, He bestows His Spirit upon His Apostolic Ministers of the Gospel, so that, by their preaching of His Word, by their absolving of repentant sinners, and by their administration of His Holy Sacraments, He visits His people in peace.

Emphasis: The Lord Jesus Is with Us in the Apostolic Ministry

The Order of Daily Catechesis in Word and Prayer

Pray and confess out loud as much from the order of daily catechesis as you and your family are able. Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

The Catechism: The Sacrament of the Altar, Part I

What is the Sacrament of the Altar?

It is the true Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ under the bread and wine, instituted by Christ Himself for us Christians to eat and to drink.

Where is this written?

The holy Evangelists Matthew, Mark, Luke, and Saint Paul write:

Our Lord Jesus Christ, on the night when He was betrayed, took bread, and when He had given thanks, He broke it and gave it to the disciples and said: "Take, eat; this is My Body, which is given for you. This do in remembrance of Me."

In the same way also He took the cup after supper, and when He had given thanks, He gave it to them, saying: "Drink of it, all of you; this cup is the New Testament in My Blood, which is shed for you for the forgiveness of sins. This do, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of Me."

Commemoration of the Emperor Constantine and Helena Sunday, 21 May Constantine I served as the Roman Emperor from A.D. 306 to 337. During his reign the persecution of Christians was forbidden by the Edict of Milan in 312, and ultimately the faith gained full imperial support. Constantine took an active interest in the life and teachings of the church, and in 325 he called the Council of Nicaea, at which orthodox Christianity was defined and defended. His mother, Helena (ca. 255-329), strongly influenced Constantine. Her great interest in locating the holy sites of the Christian faith led her to become one of the first Christian pilgrims to the Holy Land. Her investigations led to the identification of Biblical locations in Jerusalem, Bethlehem, and beyond, which are still maintained as places of worship today.

Commemoration of Queen Esther

Esther is the heroine of the Old Testament book that bears her name. Her Jewish name was Hadassah, which means "myrtle." Her beauty, charm, and courage served her well as queen to King Ahasuerus. In that role she was able to save her people from the mass extermination that Haman, the king's chief advisor, had planned. Esther's efforts to uncover the plot resulted in the hanging of Haman on the very same gallows that he had built for Mordecai, her uncle and guardian. The king thereafter named Mordecai the minister of state in Haman's place. This story is an example of how God intervenes on behalf of His people to deliver them from evil, as here through Esther He preserved the Old Testament people through whom the Messiah would come.

Commemoration of the Venerable Bede

Bede (673-735) was the last of the early church fathers and the first to compile the history of the English church. Born in Northumbria, Bede was given by his parents to a monastery in Northern England at the age of seven. The most learned man of his time, he was a prolific writer of history, whose careful use of sources provided a model for historians in the Middle Ages. Known best for his book, The Ecclesiastical History of the English People, he was also a profound interpreter of Holy Scripture; his commentaries are still fresh today. His most famous disciple, Cuthbert, reported that Bede was working on a translation of St. John's Gospel into English when death came, and that he died with the words of the Gloria Patri on his lips. He received the title "Venerable" within two generations of his death and is buried in Durham Cathedral as one of England's greatest saints.

Let each his lesson learn with care, and all the household well shall fare.
