

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This Week in the Church Year

In the light of the Lord's approaching return for the judgment of the world, the Parable of the Talents describes the stewardship of those gifts Christ freely gives in this life on earth. Each of His disciples is entrusted with different vocations and a variety of gifts, which are both a blessing and a responsibility. To whom much has been given, much shall be expected; by the same token, he who is unfaithful in a little shall not be given more, but stands to lose even what he has. It is a sobering reminder that our lives and our possessions are not our own, but a sacred trust from the Maker of the heavens and the earth. Yet, as we are thereby called to repentance, we are called to receive the free and full forgiveness of all our sins, which is the Lord's most bountiful gift and treasure of all. And as we are thus forgiven, so shall we in turn forgive those who sin against us.

Emphasis: The Gift of Forgiveness Engenders Forgiveness of Others

The Catechism: The Second Article of the Creed (Part II)

What is the Second Article of the Creed?

Commemoration of Elizabeth of Hungary

Sunday, 19 November

Born in Pressburg, Hungary, in 1207, Elizabeth was the daughter of King Andrew II and his wife Gertrude. Given as a bride in an arranged political marriage, Elizabeth became the wife of Louis of Thuringia in Germany at the age of 14. She had a spirit of Christian generosity and charity, and the home she established for her husband and three children in the Wartburg Castle at Eisenach was known for its hospitality and family love. Elizabeth often supervised the care of the sick and needy and even gave up her bed to a leper at one time. Widowed at the age of 20, she made provisions for her children and entered into an austere life as a nun in the Order of Saint Francis. Her self-denial led to failing health and an early death in 1231 at the age of 24. Remembered for her self-sacrificing ways, Elizabeth is commemorated by the many hospitals named for her around the world.

Commemoration of St. Clement of Rome, Pastor

Thursday, 23 November

Clement (ca. A.D. 35–100) is remembered for having established the pattern of apostolic authority that governed the Christian Church during the first and second centuries. He also insisted on keeping Christ at the center of the Church's worship and outreach. In a letter to the Christians at Corinth, he emphasized the centrality of Jesus' death and resurrection: "Let us fix our eyes on the blood of Christ, realizing how precious it is to His Father, since it was poured out for our salvation and brought the grace of repentance to the whole world" (1 Clement 6:31). Prior to suffering a martyr's death by drowning, he displayed a steadfast, Christ-like love for God's redeemed people, serving as an inspiration to future generations to continue to build the Church on the foundation of the prophets and apostles, with Christ as the one and only cornerstone.

Let each his lesson learn with care, and all the household well shall fare.

Ezekiel 34:11–24: The Lord God Almighty, in the Person of the incarnate Son, Christ Jesus, shall gather His scattered flock and restore them to rich pastures. He Himself shall be their one great Good Shepherd, who shall feed them and lead them, guard & protect them. He shall discipline the proud, to bring them to repentance, and strengthen the weak with the precious Word of His Gospel.

1 Corinthians 15:20–28: As Christ by His Cross has conquered death on our behalf, so is His Resurrection from the dead the guarantee of our own bodily resurrection. For as in Adam all die, so in Christ are all made alive by grace through faith in His Gospel. In Holy Baptism, we are crucified, dead & buried with Him, and therefore do we also share in His Resurrection and His Life.

St. Matthew 25:31–46: The Word of the Lord concerning the separation of the sheep and the goats depicts the final judgment, when all mankind, the living and the dead, shall be divided by the Cross of Christ. As He came, not to be served, but to serve and to give His life as a ransom for many, so do those who live by faith in His Cross gladly love and serve their neighbor for His sake. For having received all good things in Him by grace, it is no longer they who live, but Christ lives in them. Thus, the loving service of His Cross continues, not only in the preaching and administration of the Gospel in His Church, but also in the words and deeds of love with which His dear Christians give care unto others.
