
1 Corinthians 1:18–31: Though weak and foolish and useless in the eyes of the world, the Cross of Christ is the power and wisdom of God, unto salvation. It is by the Cross that Christ has atoned for our sins and reconciled us to God the Father. So also, it is by the Cross that His disciples are put to death and raised to newness of life through repentant faith in Him. Thus, the world's wisdom and strength are made nothing, and we who were nothing but sin and death are given the wisdom of God, because Christ is our righteousness and holiness.

St. John 2:13–25: In His zeal for the Lord and His House, Jesus cleanses the temple in righteous anger over those who have turned a place of divine grace into an emporium of indulgences and sinful self-righteousness. In doing so, He anticipates the wrath of God against the sins of the world, which will ultimately fall upon Christ Jesus Himself. Thereby will He make Atonement for all people, so that His own resurrected Body will be established as the Temple of the Lord.
