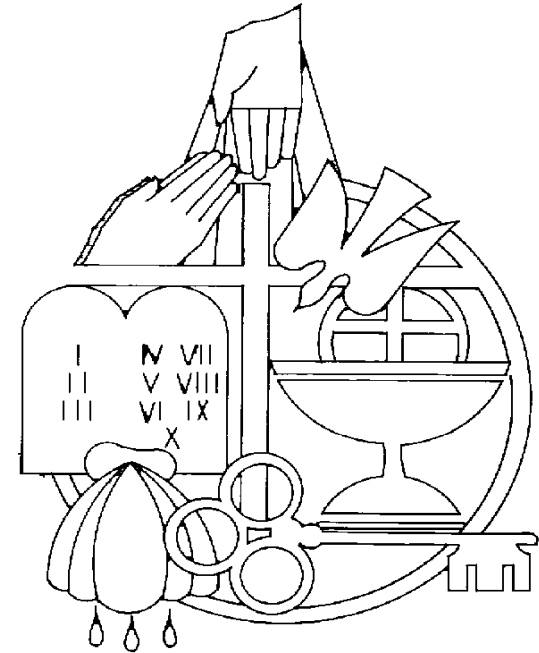

James and John, therefore, in their request to share the glory of Jesus in His Kingdom, have failed to understand that it is the glory of the Cross; that Jesus the Christ shall reign from His Cross. Even so, He does share this glory of His Cross, not only with the Apostles but also with us, by grace, in the waters of Holy Baptism and in the Cup of Salvation, which is the New Testament (or Covenant) in His blood.*

Commemoration of St. Patrick, Missionary to Ireland

Saturday, 17 March

*Patrick is one of the best-known of the missionary saints. Born to a Christian family in Britain around the year 389, he was captured as a teenager by raiders, taken to Ireland, and forced to serve as a herdsman. After six years he escaped and found his way to a monastery community in France. Ordained a bishop in 432, he made his way back to Ireland, where he spent the rest of his long life spreading the Gospel and organizing Christian communities. He strongly defended the doctrine of the Holy Trinity in a time when it was not popular to do so. His literary legacy includes his autobiography, *Confessio*, and several prayers and hymns that are still used in the church today. Patrick died around the year 466.*

Daily Themes for Intercessory Prayer:

- Sunday:** For the joy of the Resurrection; for the faithful preaching and hearing of God’s Word; for the fruit of faith nourished by the Word and Sacraments.
- Monday:** For faith to live in the promises of Holy Baptism; for vocations and daily work; for the unemployed; for the salvation and well-being of our neighbors; for Resurrection Lutheran Academy and other schools, our home schools, our colleges and seminaries; for good government and peace.

This Week in the Church Year

When Israel sinned by speaking against God and against Moses, the Lord called them to repentance by sending fiery serpents to bite them, so that many of the people died. When they confessed their sin, the Lord provided a means of rescue from death. He had Moses make a bronze serpent on a pole, and He promised that anyone who looked to it would live. So did God send His Son into the world, in the likeness of our sin and death, and lifted Him up on the pole of the Cross, that whoever looks to Him in faith may have eternal life. For He has come into the world, not for condemnation, but that the world might be saved through Him. Though you were dead in your trespasses and sins, God loves you and calls you to repentance, faith, and life in the crucified Lord Jesus Christ.

Emphasis: Christ Is Lifted Up in Death, that We May Look to Him and Live
