

This Week in the Church Year

The Apostles continue to be catechized in the theology of the Cross, which they do not yet understand. Even in the face of their Lord's clear Word of His Cross and Passion, they continue to worry and fuss over which of them shall be the greatest. St. James and St. John are so bold as to request a place of honor, at the right and left of Jesus Himself, in the glory of His Kingdom. Yet, that divine glory is to come in the Crucifixion of the Son of God, with malefactors crucified alongside of Him, one on the right and the other on the left. It is that glory of God in Christ the Crucified that is given to us, to share with Him by grace, in being baptized with His Baptism and drinking the Cup of His Blood.

Emphasis: We Share the Glory of the Cross in the Holy Sacraments

The Order of Daily Catechesis in Word and Prayer

The Catechism: The Sacrament of Holy Baptism, Part IV

What does such baptizing with water indicate?

It indicates that the Old Adam in us should by daily contrition and repentance be drowned and die with all sins and evil desires, and that a New Man should daily emerge and arise to live before God in righteousness and purity forever.

Where is this written?

Saint Paul writes in Romans chapter six: "We were therefore buried with Him through Baptism into death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life." (Romans 6:4)

The Feast of St. Joseph, the Son of David

Monday, 19 March

Although the Biblical record of St. Joseph, the foster-father of Jesus, is limited, he has been honored throughout the Christian centuries for his faithful devotion in helping the Blessed Virgin Mary raise her Son. St. Matthew relates that Joseph was a just man, who followed the angel's instructions and took the already-pregnant Mary as his wife (Matthew 1:24). In both St. Matthew and St. Mark, Jesus is referred to as "the carpenter's son" (Matthew 13:55; Mark 6:3). This suggests that Joseph had building skills with which he supported his family. Joseph was an important figure in the early life of Jesus, safely escorting St. Mary and the infant Christ-Child to Egypt (Matthew 2:14), and then settling them back in Nazareth when it was safe to do so (2:22). The final mention of Joseph is at the time the 12-year-old Jesus visits the temple in Jerusalem for the Passover (Luke 2:4ff). St. Joseph, the guardian of our Lord Jesus, has long been associated with caring parenthood as well as with skilled craftsmanship.

Let each his lesson learn with care, and all the household well shall fare.

Zechariah 9:9–13: The Church is summoned to rejoice, because her King — the Lord's Anointed (the Messiah), the promised Son of David — is coming to her, in meekness and mercy, to bestow His gift of salvation. By His victory over sin, death and hell, He grants peace and rest through His Word of the Gospel.

Philippians 2:5–11: The Glory of God is manifested in Christ Jesus, the very Son of God, who voluntarily took on the form of a servant, and humbled Himself unto death upon the Cross, in order to redeem and save all of us poor sinners.

St. Mark 14—15: The Reading of the Passion of Our Lord and Savior, Jesus the Christ, marks the beginning of Holy Week and catechizes us in the Cross. By this catechesis, as by our Baptism into Christ, to which this Word returns us, we are buried with Him in His death and raised with Him to newness of life.
