

The Solid Declaration of the Formula of Concord

XI. Election)

Although among the theologians of the Augsburg Confession there has not occurred as vet any public dissension whatever concerning the eternal election of the children of God that has caused offense, and has become wide-spread, yet since this article has been brought into very painful controversy in other places, and even among our theologians there has been some agitation concerning it; moreover, since the same expressions were not always employed concerning it by the theologians; therefore, in order, by the aid of divine grace, to prevent disagreement and separation on its account in the future among our successors, we, as much as in us lies, have desired also to present an explanation of the same here, so that every one may know what is our unanimous doctrine, faith, and confession also concerning this article. For the doctrine concerning this article, if taught from, and according to, the pattern of the divine Word [and analogy of God's Word and of faith], neither can nor should be regarded as useless or unnecessary, much less as offensive or injurious, because the Holy Scriptures not only in but one place and incidentally, but in many places, thoroughly treat and urge [explain] the same. Moreover, we should not neglect or reject the doctrine of the divine Word on account of abuse or misunderstanding, but precisely on that account, in order to avert all abuse and misunderstanding, the true meaning should and must be explained from the foundation of the Scriptures; and the plain sum and substance [of the heavenly doctrine] concerning this article, accordingly, consists in the following points:

This Week in the Church Year

The Sower sows the seed of His Word. This Word is living and powerful to conceive new life in those who hear it. But the planting of Christ is attacked by the devil, the world, and the flesh. Satan snatches the Word away from hard hearts. The riches and pleasures of this life choke off faith. Shallow and emotional belief withers in time of temptation and trouble. But see how Christ bears this attack for us! Christ's Cross was planted in the hard and rocky soil of Golgotha. A crown of thorns was placed upon His head. Satan and His demons hellishly hounded and devoured Him. Yet, through His dying and rising again, He destroyed these enemies of ours. Jesus is Himself the Seed which fell to the ground and died in order that it might sprout forth to new life and produce much grain. In Him, the weak are strong. He is the Word of the Father which does not return void but yields a harvest hundredfold.

Emphasis: Scripture Alone

The Order of Daily Catechesis in Word and Prayer

Commemoration of St. Polycarp of Smyrna, Bishop & Martyr Born around A.D. 69, St. Polycarp became one of the central figures of the early church in the second century. Apparently a disciple of the Apostle and Evangelist, St. John, Polycarp linked the first generation of believers with later Christians. Among other connections, he was a noted friend and colleague of St. Ignatius. After serving for many years as the Bishop of Smyrna, at a ripe old age Polycarp was arrested, tried, and publicly executed for his faith and testimony on 23 February, A.D. 156. A precious eyewitness narrative of his death and the events surrounding it, entitled 'The Martyrdom of Polycarp,' continues to encourage believers in times of persecution.

The Feast of St. Matthias, Apostle

St. Matthias is one of the lesser-known Apostles. According to the early Church Fathers, Matthias was one of the 72 sent out by Jesus in St. Luke 10: 1ff. After the Ascension, he was chosen by lot to fill the vacancy in the Twelve resulting from the death of Judas Iscariot (Acts 1:16–25). Early church Tradition places Matthias in a number of locations. Some historians suggest that he went to Ethiopia; others place him in Armenia, the first nation to adopt Christianity as a national religion. Martyred for his faith, Matthias may well have met his death at Colchis in Asia Minor, around A.D. 50. St. Matthias Church at Trier, Germany, claims the honor of being the final burial site for Matthias, the only one of the Apostles to be buried in Europe north of the Alps.

I Samuel 16:1–13: The Son of David, Jesus is, indeed, the Lord's anointed, the keeper of sheep who goes to lay down His life for the sheep.

I Corinthians 13:1–13: Jesus is the incarnate Love of the Father who suffers long and is kind, who is not puffed up, who never fails us.

St. Luke 18:31–43: Jesus tells the Twelve that He is going up to Jerusalem to suffer and die and rise again, but they cannot understand or grasp what He is saying. The meaning of His words is hidden from their sight. However, as Jesus makes His way up to Jerusalem, a blind man calls out to Him for mercy. This blind man sees that Jesus is the Messiah, the Savior, for he calls Him "Son of David." Jesus opens the eyes of the blind to see Him not according to outward appearances of lowliness, but according to His heart of mercy and compassion. Those who behold Him thus by faith follow Him to the Cross through death into life.
